Dear Speaker Welch:

In accordance with 30 ILCS 500/45-90(f) of the Illinois Procurement Code, the Chief Procurement Officer (CPO) is required to submit an annual report by November 1 of each year that includes a summary of contracts awarded to small businesses and an analysis of the level of the overall goal concerning purchases from small businesses.

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) awarded 616 contracts for a total value of \$252,673,391.00 to small businesses, including subcontracts, in FY2022. The average contract amount is \$410,184.07.

For FY2022, the department's total spend was \$2,157,183,407.00 which equates to an overall small business participation of 11.7%.

It is my opinion that IDOT is committed to small business contracting. In fact, the department has a dedicated bureau, the Office of Business and Workforce Diversity (OBWD), to assist small and disadvantaged businesses in becoming aware of the department's procurement and workforce opportunities. IDOT provides assistance to small businesses, including Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) firms and individuals interested in doing business with the department, in ways that ensure equity, access, and transparency. IDOT, in accordance with federal guidelines, strives to facilitate and implement programs that can help current and future business partners open the door to doing business with IDOT.

A small business compliance plan was submitted to me, by IDOT, outlining the FY2023 goals of the department. The plan has been reviewed and approved by me with the following suggestions:

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
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
